Tom Kelly In a world of instant gratification and quick fix solutions, one can be led to ponder the relevance of Jung's concept of individuation. To what extent is it possible to genuinely become oneself when there is so much pressure to perform, to consume and to acquire?

Young people in the first half of life can now have a protracted adolescence into what is commonly referred to as "adulesecence", young adults living as though still carefree, fun seeking teens. Consuming, be it clothes, food, alcohol or drugs, is the principle value and more often than not leads, like the uroboros eating its own tail, to the threat of being consumed by the dragon of debt.

While people in the second half of life are living longer, retiring earlier and having more leisure time, the primary concern seems to focus more on whether enough money has been saved than on spiritual development.

In the hectic pace of our modern world where time is an increasingly rare commodity, it is often difficult to stop and take time to reflect. This lecture is meant to offer a pause, a time for reflection: Do we still have time to individuate in today's world? Is Jung's concept of individuation still relevant?

Eaten by a Lion : *The Gospel of Thomas* Wynette Barton "Blessed is the lion eaten by a man, and the lion becomes human; cursed is the man eaten by a lion, and the lion becomes human." ("Logion 6," *The Gospel of St. Thomas*)

When *The Gospel of Thomas* was rediscovered in Nag Hamadi in 1945, there were predictions that it would revolutionize Christianity. This relatively short text of 114 sayings attributed to Jesus first seems very much like what we already know of this teacher. A closer look reveals puzzling paradoxes. With careful study, a pattern emerges suggesting that Jesus was talking about no more - and no less - than the process of becoming conscious.

As we examine images in Thomas's gospel we discover something about the mysterious power of the lion that can be eaten - or can eat us. Can we take in powerful, paradoxical words, digest them, "eat" them, or will we be devoured by them?
